

YERVOY® (ipilimumab) contains the active substance ipilimumab, a protein which helps your immune system to attack and destroy cancer cells.<sup>1</sup>

This guide has been designed to help you to identify any side effects that you may experience while you are on ipilimumab treatment.

You have been prescribed ipilimumab in order to treat advanced melanoma (a type of skin cancer) in adults.

- YERVOY can cause serious side effects in various parts of the body that need to be addressed immediately, regardless of their severity.<sup>1</sup>
- Symptoms may include diarrhoea, eye or skin yellowing, skin rash with or without itching, blurry vision, pain in the eye, muscle weakness, numbness or tingling in legs, arms or face, or headache.<sup>1</sup>
- Before you receive treatment, inform your doctor of all known medical conditions.
- Call your doctor immediately if you develop any of the symptoms described in this guide, any other symptoms, or if the symptoms persist or get worse.
- Always carry your Patient Alert Card with you and show it to any doctor you consult.

# 1 Eye1

- · Redness in the eye
- · Pain in the eye

· Vision problems or blurry vision

### 2 Liver¹

- Eye or skin yellowing (jaundice)
- Pain on the right side of your stomach area
- Tiredness
- · Dark urine

## B Nerve¹

- Muscle weakness
- Numbness or tingling in legs, arms or face
- · Dizziness
- Loss of consciousness or difficulty waking up

## Bowel and stomach¹

- Diarrhoea (watery, loose or soft stools)
- Bloody or darker-coloured stools
- More frequent bowel movements than usual
- Pain or tenderness in your stomach, or abdominal area
- Nausea
- Vomiting

# Skin¹

- Skin rash with or without itching
- · Blisters and/or peeling of the skin
- · Mouth sores
- Dry skin

### General<sup>1</sup>

- Fever
- Headaches
- Tiredness

- · Bleeding
- Behavioural changes (e.g. less sex drive, being irritable or forgetful)
- Under no circumstances should you attempt to treat these symptoms yourself. You should seek medical assistance.
- Always carry your Patient Alert Card with you and show it to any doctor you consult (for example, if your regular doctor is unavailable or you are travelling).

# What to expect with your YERVOY treatment<sup>1</sup>

### Before treatment, your doctor may check:

- if you are taking corticosteroids or other treatments that affect the immune system
- if you are taking any medicines that stop your blood from clotting (anticoagulants)
- liver function tests (LFTs)
- thyroid function tests
- if you have an autoimmune disease
  (a condition where the body attacks its own cells)
- your general physical condition to determine whether you are suitable for treatment
- if you have or have ever had a chronic viral infection of the liver, including:
  - hepatitis B (HBV)
  - hepatitis C (HCV)
- if you have human immunodeficiency virus (HIV) infection or acquired immune deficiency syndrome (AIDS).

Also tell your doctor if you are pregnant, breast-feeding or planning to become pregnant.


